CASA DEL POMBA: The old standby, Deacon Dave Rezendes' "Casa del Pomba" (House of the Dove), opened on Saturday with more than 200,000 lights in its display and a special theme to celebrate his 20th anniversary of his ordination as a Roman Catholic deacon.

Dave's home is located at 352 Hillcrest Ave. and is open to the public free of charge as his gift to the community.

It is all about homes around the valley, and beyond that people can see the wondrous displays their owners have created. Directions and photographs to each home are included on the site.

Everyone gives in his or her own way. Deacon Dave for 20 years has given back with his beautiful and whimsical light displays, and Alex Dourov makes it possible for all of us to see these wonderful celebrations, even if it is only on our computer.

A CALL FOR HELP: Another way people can help others during this season is through the Kiwanis Club of Livermore. The club is hosting parties for children at the Tri-Valley Haven for Women and the Sojourner House, a new home created by the Haven for homeless families with children and teens that opened in October.
